It's been a long stretch since our last meeting so hopefully a lot of us will have the desire to attend the upcoming one. Saturday, the 16th of November, at 12:00 noon is the time. 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Summer's over and with it one of the best seasons for Lotus touring. Many of us saw it out with a triple-header -- a veritable orgy of Lotus events: the long-awaited "All British Field Meet" in Portland; a short reunion at Bellingham's Lotus dealer -- Dewey Griffin Imports; and the "Washington History of Motor Sports Festival," a fancy name for vintage and historic car races at S.I.R.

As you all should have been well aware, given Terry Elmore's efforts at publicity amongst us, Labor Day Weekend brought the 9th Annual "All British Field Meet" at Portland International Raceway, featuring Lotus as this year's honored make. It's difficult to describe the various highlights of a three-day weekend crammed full of Lotus adventures (and mis-adventures). All of us who went have our own stories -- those of you who missed it all should come to our next "regularly scheduled" meeting to hear them and see the pictures we brought back.

51 Lotuses on display Saturday + a couple more on Sunday - - - - 9 of them Sevens!  
- - - - Two of Pete Lovely's vintage Lotus Formula 1's (But where were all the other vintage Lotus racers from the Northwest?) - - - - A pretty light blue early Elite which won "Favorite Lotus" - - - - A mouth-watering group of Esprits, late Elites, and a lone Sprint - - - - Elans and Europas seemingly stretched out to the horizon - - - - An unscheduled run out to the Malibu Grand Prix in Beaverton where Rob Roberts once again demonstrated superior autocross skills and put us all to shame - - - - Lotuses attending the awards banquet all parked in a carpeted display area - - - - Satch Carlson who proved to be better read than heard - - - - Our own Jim Kirbach winning First Place in the Europa category with his new black & gold JPS and Jim Orgill taking home the Third Place award in the same category - - - -

Sunday: A day for slaloming, swapmeeting, "Fun(?) Crossing," and a couple laps of P.I.R. to put all the Lotuses on display once again - - - - Terry and Lezlee Elmore playing musical chairs with their borrowed van and trailer and various troubled

Lotuses (Somehow there was always only one undriveable Lotus at a time!) - - - - The "miraculous" cure of the above-mentioned van of its breakdown on the way home - - - - And best of all, the many new friends we made in the Lotus community from Washington, Oregon, and British Columbia.

For those of you who crave further adventure of this sort, Lotus Ltd., the national Lotus club, announced in their August newsletter that a West Coast Lotus meet is being planned for March, 1986 at Morrow Bay, California. It will be co-sponsored with Lotus West, an L.A. club, and Golden Gate Lotus Club of San Francisco.

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Starting with this issue, I've agreed to lend a hand with the compiling and editing of the Evergreen Lotus Newsletter. We're going to let Terry Elmore off the hook for a bit -- if he puts as much time and effort into his pile of Elites as he has in the past year into organizing the club and its newsletter, he'll have a Lotus of his own on the road before he knows it. Just think -- no more tours with a string of Lotuses suffering the indignity of swallowing the fumes of a diesel rabbit! But, seriously folks, I think we all owe Terry a hand (Clap! Clap!) and our thanks for getting the club off the ground. Now it's time for the rest of us to pitch in and do our share.

For those of you who may never have come to a meeting or event -- try just one! It's always a treat to get together and look over each other's cars and we'd love to see yours. As far as I know, there are no "concours" cars in the club (even Jim Kirbach's All British Field Meet First Place Europa is a "driver") and there are some of us one step up from being basketcases, so don't let that stop you. 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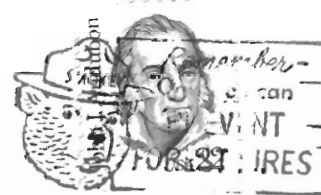
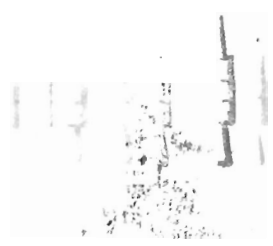
A Sad Note --
