

We need to lure back some of the members we've lost in the past few years (I will be making some efforts in this regard, by getting on the phone and calling as many of our "lost" members as I can, to see if we can get them back- if you would like to help on this, talk to me at the next meeting- if you are a lapsed member, expect a phone call, or of course you're welcome to call any of the club officers yourself and say you're back with us, or at least let us know why you haven't renewed). One thing I feel we definitely need is as a minimum, one event each month that all members can attend. Such things as tours, while a great idea and definitely something we should continue to have, shouldn't take the place of a monthly meeting, as otherwise, for all the members other than those going on the tour there is in effect nothing club-related for several months in a row between meetings. This is not to say that meetings alone are enough- we need to make meetings more interesting, and provide something that will entice members to come out and attend (or better, participate). This idea of a drive before this next meeting is an example- if you want to something a bit more active, and feel like going for a drive, then show up at the Lake Side Cafe; if you don't want to, or don't have the time, at least we hope we'll see you at the meeting itself. We definitely need some tech sessions—as soon as I have two hands again, I will be having probably a series of sessions on glass work, to which all members will be welcome, including bringing along their own parts to work on. We can have special themes for meetings—for example, I am going to be making a concerted effort to get as many early Elites to the June meeting here as I possibly can, as it's quite amazing how many there are in this area.

Well, without belaboring the point any more than I have, I hope you get the idea. We need to all start getting more active in the club, and not just expect John and Nikki to do it all themselves—I know from experience that's no fun. Gary and Randall Fehr have done a fine job on the newsletter, but I'm sure they would welcome your cotributions rather than having to come up with a full issue themselves each time. I hope we'll see you at the next meeting— and and many of the events throughout the next few months; see the calendar for details.

Lastly, best wishes to Bob Crichton-Bob has had several surgeries in the past few months, and seems to recovering well. Keep it up, and we hope we'll see you and your Seven back on the road soon!



I recently joined the England-based Historic Lotus Register, and in so doing also found out about the Mark VI Associates, which covers the same cars here and acts as the US Correspondent for the HLR. Before I go any further, I should define what a Historic Lotus is, at least in the context of the HLR- they cover all the early cars, from the Mk III (the whereabouts of the Lotus Mk I and Mk II are not known, as it's presumed they have disappeared), through the VI, Seven series 1, the aerodynamic Lotus (Mks. 8,9,10,11) and continuing with such types as the 12,15,16,17, and 18. Sevens after the series 1, and early Elites are not specifically covered, as these have their own specific clubs (the Elite, by the way, was the Mark 14)(there was no Mark V, and no Mark 13, this latter number being the Eleven series 2, in case you were wondering about the missing numbers. I have now received three issues of each of the group newsletters, the HLR issues for August and December '88, and for March '89 (this is a quarterly), and the first three 1989 issues of Mark VI (produced 10 issues per year), and can highly recommend them to members interested in the early cars. Issues are a mix of reprints of old articles on the cars, most of which I have not seen previously, with details of cars as currently being restored and raced in historic racing, club events (primarily in England), details of parts interchanges, new parts manufacturing, ads for cars for sale and wanted, etc. HLR will be participating, along with all the other UK Lotus clubs, in Lotus 89 in August, and I'm sure they'll be fielding a fantastic assortment of early Lotus. There are a number of historic Lotus in this area- two Mk 9s, several Elevens (one ex-Jim Kirbach), quite a few Elites, a 17 and an 18 and a 19 presently for sale in BC- hopefully we'll see some of these in some of the vintage races this summer, although the continuing escalation in value of historic Lotus has meant that fewer and fewer are being raced, as they're just too valuable now. Recent ads have offered a Fifteen, a 22, a 23, and a 46, all at \$145,000-150,000!! This means that the cars are now being replicated, as one can make for example a brand-new Mk VI (using Progress Chassis, and Len Pritchard of Williams and Pritchard, who produced the original chassis and bodywork replectively) for less that an original VI would cost, as these are now over \$30,000, and one was apparently sold recently to a Japanese buyer (with more money than sense) for ±30,000, or approx. \$55,000!

Membership in the HLR is by donation, and they request about £20 for a two-year membership- alternately, you can pay \$40.00 through the US Correspondent Mark VI Associates and avoid the currency exchange. The Mark VI newsletter is \$10/year for 10 issues. See my issues at the next meeting, if you are interested.

An idea whose time has come- actually, as you may recall there was to have been a Meet here last year, but it had to be cancelled at the last minute at the winery that was to be the site went bankrupt, and the receivers would not allow the event to take place there.

But, with an extra year to plan, this meet is shaping up to be a good one. Even thought the organizers are making conscious efforts to keep this inaugural meet simple, they are actively soliciting the support of the many British marque clubs in the area, both in the planning stages and for the actual running of the meet. A schedule of events is printed on the page opposite.

Bob Crichton and I attended the last organizing committee meeting, on which I am our club's representative, to give our input on the breakdown of classes for Lotus, and there will be four:

- 1) First Generation, Sevens, Elites and competition, and Cortinas
- 2) Elans and Plus 2s
- 3) Europas
- 4) Third Generation- Elite/Eclat, Esprit

One thing the organizers are pushing, which I think is great and should prove to be most beneficial to our group, is that each marque is being encouraged to set up a marquee, tent or something, and provide displays with club literature, regalia, etc- this obviously will be a great opportunity for us to reach other Lotus owners in the area to expand our membership. Each marque will also be responsible to collecting and counting the peopleschoice ballots for their marque.

I would <u>love</u> to shock the organizers, and other clubs with a huge turnout of Lotus; between our group, the BC group and perhaps some cars up from Oregon, I think we should be able to field, say 40 cars—how does that sound as a goal! Space is no problem, we will be allotted as much space as we need for our cars and tent/whatever.

As we now have approximately three months to the meet, I would ask that anyone interested in working on a committee to prepare our club display, get in touch with me or John Daniels- we'll be discussing this further and calling for volunteers at the next few meetings as well. Some possibilities you might want to think about- preparing some illustrated display boards on the Lotus types on display, with technical info etc; coming up with some new/additional club regalia to sell; producing a bigger, slick newsletter issue special for the Meet, for be available for new members we recruit or bona fide prospective Lotus owners; a "detail party" the night before the display, where we get together and detail all the cars that will be on display the next day, and then caravan to the Meet on Saturday as a group- this also gives the members who won't have a running Lotus for the Meet a chance to help out, and then perhaps they can grab an empty seat for the caravan. I'm sure we can think of other things, but the sooner we start to organize this the smoother it will go. I am going to write to Lotus Car USA to see if they can provide us with any support in the way of banners on loan, brochures. to hand out, etc. Any other ideas- bring 'em along to the meetings. I have provided some initial info to the LCCBC, and I'll be attending their next couple of meetings(the next being Wed. May 3rd- anyone want to ride up with me?), and I hope we can get a good turnout from them as well.

VINTAGE WEEKEND Westwood track, BC July 22,23

This event, which almost certainly will be the final vintage event at Westwood since the land has been sold to developers, unfortunately takes place the same weekend as the Meet above— if however you're not a baseball fan and want to pass up the Sunday Mariners game, you might want to head up north for this.
